Feature Article: Vacuum Excavators

Vacuum excavators, or industrial vacuum units, are highly useful for a wide range of jobs, such as removing debris or water from drains or trenches, vacuuming up animal waste or other materials, and cleaning up after natural disasters. When determining whether to purchase one for your facility or rent by the job, there are several factors to consider. "In many cases, the rental cost throughout the year will pay for a trailer mounted vacuum that will do the work of the larger truck vacs," explains Brian Showley of Vac-Tron Equipment. "Worst case scenario, the unit is paid for in two to three years, but it also allows the facility to do daily maintenance throughout the year, keeping the stalls and drainage system clean. This makes for a healthier environment for the horses."

There are a variety of types of vacuum excavators on the market, so how does one choose the best type? For equestrian facilities, Brian recommends the LP (low profile) series from Vac-Tron. "The LP series is the best choice for industrial cleanup applications," he says. "This machine provides the filtration system that can handle even the smallest of dust particles and

contains them to a cyclone and filter canister so they are not expelled into the air inside the facility. This unit also has a full engine enclosure for quiet operation. There are systems that only provide vacuum such as our CS (competitive series) models, but in most applications the combination of vacuum and high pressure water systems (hydro) are required. This combination allows our LP series to do multiple cleanup jobs and have onboard water to clean the unit after the job is complete. This same unit can do vacuum excavation projects on the facility property such as locate existing utilities, help in the repair of broken or leaking water lines, and transporting excavated materials to the dump site."

Vac-Tron offers diesel, super diesel, and gas models with a variety of features, including hydraulically operated, full-open rear doors and waterproof, lockable control panels. All Vac-Tron trailers are engineered and built for low profile towing which provides a level of safety that may not be seen in other equipment, and service points are accessible from curbside. LEGIS Corner: Serving on a Board of Directors

Being involved in your sport can sometimes mean that you serve on a board of directors. This is a great opportunity learn more about the sport you are involved in and to help make a difference. However, you also need to make sure you are protected. Does the group you are serving maintain some kind of liability policy for clubs and associations? If not, then if a claim is made against the association, the organization will have to hire an attorney using its own funds. This scenario can quickly cause an organization to go out of business, but liability insurance will provide legal defense in most instances.

Additionally, make sure the club or association maintains Directors and Officers Coverage in addition to liability. If a disgruntled person makes a legal claim against the organization, each of the directors is likely to be specifically named. Without D&O coverage, each individual director would then be responsible for providing his own legal defense. The personal assets of each director or officer could be at risk in a lawsuit.
